Description: Large mahogany bookcase, circa 1825-30. It is the smaller brother of the bookcase presented to the Museum in 1919 by the grandchildren of Sir William Lawrence Bart F.R.S. Letter in accession file dated 1918 offered the Museum "a very fine and exceptionally large old mahogany bookcase in two portions. The smaller portion we hope to retain in the family, but the larger portion (approx. 17.6 long by 11' high)...[is] offered to the London Museum". The bookcase was designed for Sir William Lawrence, the celebrated surgeon, for the house which was being completed for him at 18 Whitehall Place. The designer, according to family lore, may be Lawrence's friend, Sir John Soane. The letter continues "I may say that it was among the articles scheduled by the Treasury as exempt from State duty under the Finance Act as being of historic or artistic interest". The item was received and set up in the London Museum, as acknowledged in a letter of 27 March 1919.

In 1951 the family offered the museum the smaller part of the bookcase, to go with the larger part already received in 1919. Grimes replies "we certainly have the other half of the bookcase to which you refer, though at present it is dismantled, being too big - that is, too high - for use at Kensington Palace". This

second part was delivered to a museum store in Southwark in January 1952. It would seem it has remained dismantled ever since.

In order to conserve space, the stables were placed above the coach houses with the hay lofts and living accommodation above the stables. The appearance of this prototype attracted a great deal of interest, particularly since it was the first purpose-built plane to be armed with guns and to fulfil a 'fighter' role. The plane earned the nickname 'Destroyer'. It was designed as a 'pusher type' aircraft: the engine and propeller were positioned behind the pilot at the rear of the aeroplane, thus pushing it forward. This configuration greatly resolved the problem, later solved by the invention of an 'interruptor' mechanism, of how to fire through the arc of the propeller without destroying it. The EFB1 (eventually abbreviated to FB1) was the forerunner of the well-known Vickers 'Gunbus'. Model of the Vickers 'Gunbus' model biplane.

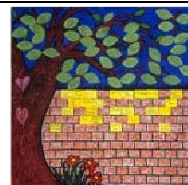

Description: The first Austin 7 rolled off the production line at the Longbridge car plant on the 21 July

1922. The Austin 7 was first displayed to the public at the Olympia Motor Show in London that year. The car's designer and company founder, Herbert Austin, described it as a 'small family car within reach of modest purses...it offers a comfortable type of body capable of enclosure against bad weather...it combines a lively road performance with an all-round smoothness of running and a feeling of safe stability.'

Austin marketed the 7 as an affordable family car at a time when the company faced stiff competition from rival manufacturers Morris and Ford. Austin was one of only two British car manufacturers (the other being Crossley of Manchester) to be exhibited at the Berlin Motor Show in 1935. Herbert Austin showed Adolf Hitler the Austin 7 shortly before the dictator announced the creation of the 'Volkswagen' (People's Car) at the show.

This is a Type EB 'Nippy', a two-seater sports model of the Austin 7 which went into production in 1934. It would have retailed for around £112 in 1935 when this car was sold. The body of the 'Nippy' is virtually identical to the 1933 Type 65 with the exception that the body panelling was made of pressed steel in the later model. Production of the 'Nippy' at Longbridge ceased in February 1937. The Austin 7 marque itself was discontinued in 1939. This particular car was originally registered in Devon in 1935. After undergoing restoration, including an engine replacement, the car entered the ownership of a Londoner who donated it to the Museum of London in 2002. 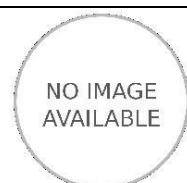
